Tammy (Workman) is a new member of UDC Admiral Semmes 57 chapter in Auburn, Alabama. Before she became a UDC member, she attended Confederate history events, such as an authentic play in Tallassee and re-enactment of the Battle of Selma and the ball. She wore authentic 1860's dresses and hair styles.

Tammy met Scotty Myers at Fiddler's Green re-enactment near Jacksonville, Alabama. They were wearing 1860's clothes as re-enactors. They were married in the fall 2017 in an outdoor ceremony in 1860's clothes in the hills of north Georgia. The honeymoon trip into Tennessee included the Button-willow Civil War Dinner Theater and a shopping spree at the favorite sutler, "Blockade Runner".

Scotty and Tammy were re-enactors at the Battles for the Armory on November 9,10, 11 & 12, 2017, (the 20th Annual Civil War Re-Enactment) at Gibson's View Plantation, Tallassee, Alabama. They lived in a tent those days just as Confederate soldiers did.

On November 9, School Day, they helped with the tours of living history. Scotty was in the re-enactments of the Battle of Chehaw Station on November 11 and the Skirmish at Franklin, Alabama on November 12.

Scottie and Tammie were hosts for the January 21, 2018 meeting of the UDC Admiral Semmes 57 chapter at their home in Alexander City, Alabama that features photos of them in 1860's clothes and Confederate mementos. Colonel Scotty Myers presented the program on Confederate history that included showing his collection of Confederate flags: Bonnie Blue Flag, Alabama Flag of Secession, Confederate Battle Flag, First National Flag, Second National Flag and Third National Flag (Blood Stain Flag).

Scotty immersed himself into re-enacting six years ago following a bout with throat



cancer. Determined to make the most of his life as a cancer survivor, he picked up the hobby that he had always dreamed of. As a child he always played "Army".

Scotty re-enacts for several reasons: "to honor his own ancestors and the thousands of other patriots who defended the Southern Cause; to preserve Southern history for our children and grandchildren; and to correct Civil War history that has been subverted in the schools, textbooks and media."



Since joining the re-enactors, Scotty has been promoted into the Division of Staff ranks. His passion and knowledge of the War Between the States has afforded him speaking opportunities before small and large groups,

including presentations on the truth regarding our Confederate flags.

In addition to his Command Staff position

with the 1st Division, Infantry, he has membership with the 31st Alabama Co. F and membership in the Hutto SCV Camp, Jasper, Alabama. Scotty also portrays President Jefferson Davis at re-enactment events and at the First Confederate White House in Montgomery.



His first re-enactment, along with his son, Whit, was in the Battle of Tallassee in November 2011. Part of authentic re-enacting includes camping just as Confederate ancestor soldiers did in the 1860's.

Scotty and the other members of Co. F sleep under canvas tents, cook on an open campfire and drill. Rain, cold or snow does not deter these re-enactors.

Yankees Honor Two Buffalo Killers

"Scientific Buffalo Hunter," published in Guns & Ammo's second issue described the exploits of Civil War-veteran Frank Mayer. Mayer used a .45-120-550 Sharps fitted with a German-made 10X scope to <u>allegedly kill thousands of bison</u> until he re-enlisted in the US Army in 1875. He retired 35 years later as a colonel.

A short sidebar to the article spotlighted another Sharps used by famous buffalo hunter, Bill Tilghman. His second wife, Zoe Tilghman, was photographed holding the rifle and was quoted, "With it, he killed 7,500 buffalo; hunters kept accounts daily. He wore it out until the barrel was smooth inside, sent it to the factory and had it rebored and new rifling in a larger caliber. In 1874, his horse fell with him; gun in saddle scabbard, stock broken. He had just killed a buffalo . . ." (Emphasis added)

Editor's note: Yankee Generals Sherman & Sheridan wage total war on the Indians, learned by war crimes against the South, during the War of 1861-1865.
